TASK: Does God exist? Explain whether or not God exists. Write a 500-word essay to explain your point of view; you must refer to one of arguments for the existence of God. (Religious Experience, Cosmological, Teleological arguments and Ontological)

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Ethics

TASK: Research the issue of euthanasia, looking at the legal issues and real life cases.

The Government have decided to review the idea of legalising voluntary euthanasia in the UK. Write a letter to the Parliament to persuade them to make euthanasia legal in the UK or to keep it illegal. Your letter must include: Your viewpoint on why euthanasia is moral or immoral and why you believe it, real life example cases to support your idea and the benefits you believe keeping euthanasia illegal/legal would have for the future.

Key terms to include:

- sanctity of life
- quality of life
- voluntary euthanasia
- non-voluntary euthanasia

TASK: Research one ethical theories, choosing from Utilitarianism, Kantian ethics or Situation ethics. Write an essay explaining what the ethical theory you have chosen would conclude on the issue of the death penalty. You must explain the theory you have researched and then apply this theory to the death penalty, evaluating whether or not the theory would support or refute the use of the death penalty. Give specific examples to support your argument.
