# Spring End-of-Term Report by C+K for North Halifax Grammar School

# Impact of Guidance Survey 2021-22

During Summer and Autumn terms 2021, C+K Careers undertook its biennial survey to evaluate the impact of Careers Guidance in school. At the beginning of the careers interview students were asked to complete a simple questionnaire about how they were feeling about their future. At the end of the careers interview the students completed a further questionnaire stating how they felt after the session. Below are some key results produced by the survey.

**1076 students in Calderdale schools** commented on the concerns they had about their future and whether working with their C+K Careers Adviser had made a difference.

Students were asked the extent to which they agreed with the statement 'When you think about the future, I'm confident about making the right decision' both before and after working with their C+K Careers Adviser:

This data shows that before their guidance interview 30.51% of students were not feeling confident about their plans, whereas after their interview 95.98% were feeling more confident.

The biggest concerns for Year 10 & 11 students across Calderdale were getting the GCSE grades they need (57.78%), choosing the right course/subject (46.11%), not knowing what career they want to do later (37.67%) and making the wrong choice of  $6^{th}$  form/college (36.43%). 21.82% were also anxious about the effect of the pandemic on their future.

6<sup>th</sup> form students were anxious about choosing the right HE course (38.89%), getting an apprenticeship or job (36.11%), deciding whether to go to university (30.56%) and not knowing what career to pursue (30.56%). They were less worried about the effect of the pandemic than Year 10 & 11 students (5.56%).

**After** working 1:1 with their C&K Careers Adviser in school only 0.75% thought the interview had made no difference to their concerns. In contrast:

- 68.84% knew more about the possibilities and opportunities open to them
- 65.49% felt more confident
- 53.45% felt it had been important to check out their thinking and ideas
- 50.65% felt clearer about what to do next
- 37.50% felt more motivated
- 20.62% thought they knew what they wanted but hadn't checked out what else they could do
- 18.10% felt less concerned about the impact of the pandemic on their future plans
- 12.59% knew what might be holding them back

**90 students from North Halifax Grammar School** (NHGS) completed the impact of guidance survey. The results are as follows:

'When you think about the future, I'm confident about making the right decision':

The biggest concerns to Year 11 students were: choosing the right course/subjects (64.29%), making the wrong choice of college/6<sup>th</sup> Form (42.86%), not knowing what career they want to do (38.10%), getting the GCSE grades they need (28.57%), applying to college/6<sup>th</sup> Form (19.05%), coping with the workload (15.48%) and not enjoying the course/s they choose (15.48%). There is a marked increase in anxieties around making the wrong choice of college/6<sup>th</sup> Form from the previous survey in 2020 (up from 0%). This is perhaps unsurprising given the impact of the pandemic on careers related activities and more limited opportunities to visit colleges/providers and interact with employers. Guidance was given to help students understand and address their concerns with advice provided around the best ways to research course content, entry requirements, learning styles and also advice given to attend open events and taster events where possible to help them consider learning environments, facilities and locations.

It was pleasing to note there was a decrease in anxieties about getting an apprenticeship from the previous survey in 2020 (down from 20.21% to 4.76%) – this could be due to the economy improving and labour market opening up following the height of the pandemic, resulting in more opportunities becoming available.

Of the 6<sup>th</sup> Form students surveyed, the biggest concerns were: getting an apprenticeship/job (100%), not knowing what career they wanted to do (80%), which course to choose (60.00%), deciding whether to go to university (40.00%), which university to choose (20%) and job prospects after a degree (20%).

When Years 11-13 students were asked if they thought speaking to a Careers Adviser (CA) had made a difference to them:

- 75.56% reported they now knew more about the possibilities available to them
- 74.44% felt it was important to check out their thinking and ideas
- 52.22% felt more confident
- 28.89% felt clearer about what they needed to do next
- 23.33% felt more motivated
- 17.78% thought they had known what they wanted to do, but hadn't checkout out other ideas

- 6.67% knew what might be holding them back
- 4.44% felt less concerned about the impact of the pandemic on their future plans
- 1.11% felt that it hadn't made any difference.

The results show that students often feel overwhelmed and worried when they think about their future. There are so many different pathways and qualifications of offer – each with different entry requirements, and so many sources of advice, it can be quite daunting for students to know which is the best route for them. One to one guidance interviews support students to clarify their ideas and identify the different and appropriate options, which then helps them to feel more positive and confident about the choices they make.

# Achievements this term

#### Work with Year 11

All Year 11 students were invited for at least one 1:1 guidance interview to discuss career ideas, post-16 options and help with applications by the end of February. Any who did not attend were followed up by the end of the Spring term.

As well as face-to-face individual interviews with students, other contact has been by email, phone, texts and contact with parents/carers via phone, text and email. The CA has contacted the parents/carers where necessary. This is to ensure that parents/carers are informed about the options available, the application process, including opportunities for research, such as open events, and to check that they can support their son/daughter.

#### **College Applications**

The most popular choices for college/6<sup>th</sup> Form applications are NHGS Sixth Form, Greenhead College and Huddersfield New College. Students with an interest in vocational learning have mainly opted for Bradford College, Calderdale College and Kirklees College. However, the majority of NHGS students pursue the academic route, preferring NHGS as their first choice.

### **Apprenticeship Applicants**

In the guidance interviews, the CA provided advice about job hunting strategies, and gave further advice and practical support with writing a CV. The CA also ensured these students were aware they needed to have an application in for a full-time course at college in the event they don't secure an employer for an apprenticeship by September.

The CA organised an apprenticeship information and registration session in school for Year 11 students interested in apprenticeships. This was delivered in conjunction with the Apprenticeships Consultant from the National Apprenticeships Service.

#### Vulnerable students

The CA identified students categorised as having had 'Disrupted Education' and at risk of being NEET and will provide additional support over the coming months in order to maximise positive outcomes/destinations.

## National Apprenticeship Week & National Careers Week

Information and resources available for these two weeks were shared with the Careers Leader and Careers Officer so activities could be planned for form tutor sessions and during curriculum lessons as appropriate.

# **MyDirections**

C+K's new website was introduced to students at the end of the Autumn term and rolled out across all year groups at the start of the Spring term. It has been well received so far and encouraged students to contact the CA with any career-related queries.

### Other work

- Contact with students in Years 12 and 13 to assist with discussing career ideas, options, apprenticeship/job research and making applications.
- Attendance in person at the NHGS Apprenticeship Evening for advice and guidance.
- Guidance and support with options for Year 12 students struggling with A-levels.
- Apprenticeship opportunities circulated including degree apprenticeship with the Police
- Available for guidance at online Parents' Evenings for Years 10 and 11 and for the Year 9 online Parents'/GCSE Choices Evening. The online formats resulted in some parents seeking advice via email & telephone and they expressed positive comments about the help and support that the CA provided.
- Weekly lunchtime Careers Club for Years 7 & 8 students.
- Guidance interviews for Pupil Premium students in Years 7-11 and any other students referred by staff where extra support was needed.
- Promoted the C+K Careers Kirklees Apprenticeship event and the Calderdale Apprenticeship event held on 16th and 24th March respectively at the John Smiths Stadium and Shay Stadium.
